<u>COURSE OUTLINE</u>

Throughout the course, students continually focus on analyzing global patterns of change over time, and connecting these patterns in their local communities to those affecting the larger world. Students will also become conscious of human commonalities and differences through the comparison of societies, and their reaction to global processes and changes.

HABITS OF MIND/THINKING SKILLS

The thinking skills lessons are built around are: **Contextualization, Comparison, Causation, and Change and Continuity Over Time**. These habits of mind will help students, not just for this throughout life as they are forced to make important decisions for themselves and others. Primary and secondary sources (such as texts, maps, and visuals) will be used to develop the student's ability to discover point of view, bias, and diversity of thought within documents. Practice with primary source analysis will form skills required to make high-level evaluations and arguments.

<u>ATTENDANCE</u>

Attendance will be taken each class period. Students who arrive to class after the bell rings will be marked late/tardy. Students who arrive to class less than 10 minutes late will be marked late. Student who are more than 10 minutes late will be marked tardy. Students are expected to remain in class for the entirety of the period. If a student leaves class, without a pass, and is gone for more than 10 minutes they will be marked tardy. Students who are repeatedly late or tardy will be assigned the consequences and interventions outlined in the student handbook.

ASBSENCES & LATE WORK

Because the dates of quizzes/assessments are known ahead of time, students are expected to take quizzes/assessments on the days they are scheduled. If there are known conflicts (vacations, appointments, etc.) talk to Mr. Spencer ahead of time. Students have **one week** (7 days) to make up missed quizzes due to absences.

If an assignment needs to be turned in late, students have **2 days** to do so without penalty, after that there is no guarantee of full credit. *EXCEPTION:* large group projects in which the date has been previously given. All work must be turned in on time.

Plagiarism or cheating is not tolerated in any class. Plagiarism includes:

- 1) Claiming someone else's work as your own
- 2) Copying someone's work and altering it to make it yours.

Any assignment that is deemed to have engaged in any type of plagiarism or academic dishonesty **will receive a zero for the assignment, to which the assignment may not be made up**. This applies to all work turned in.
